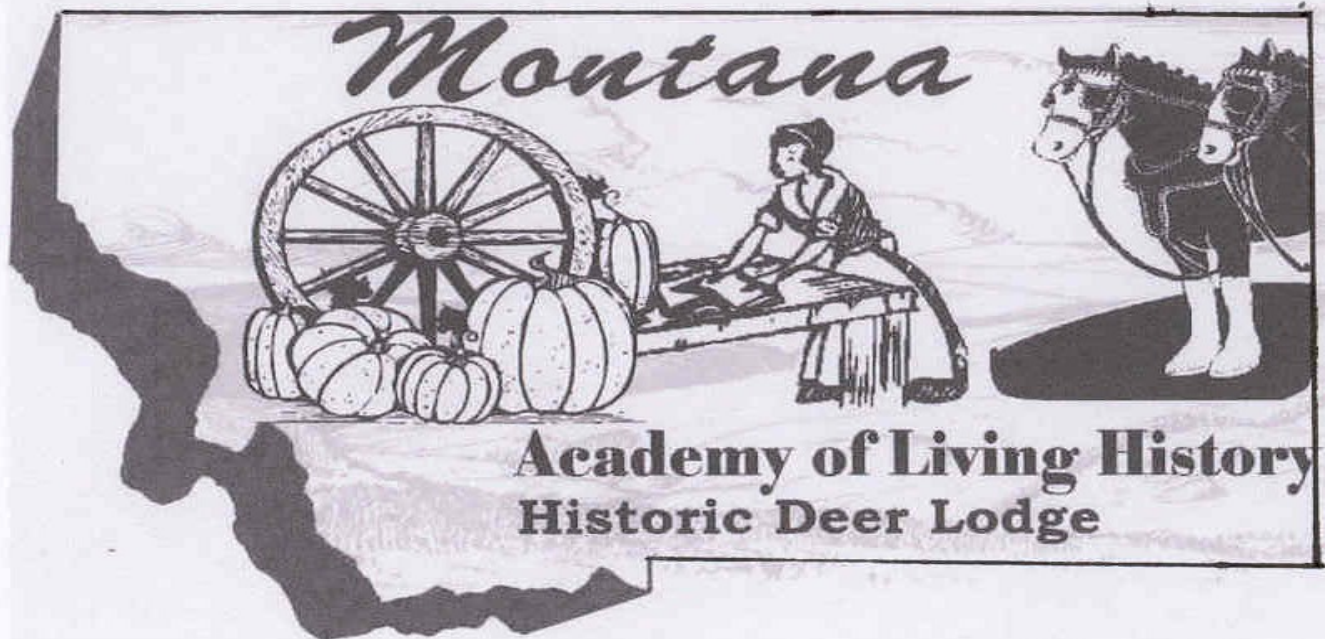

These are the Old Prison Museums including the Territorial Prison and the Grant-Kohrs Ranch, a National Historic Site dating from 1859. These locations provide appropriate settings for living history workshops, and programs providing understand and/or re-creating the heirloom cultures, skills, environments and experiences of the peoples who lived here now and in the past.

Our list of courses this year provide educational and fun opportunities in skills ranging from rug crocheting, Dutch oven cooking, birding, gold panning, beef judging, horsehair hitching, barn viewing, Beaverslide haying, wool spinning and vintage tractor display. There are evening lectures on western artists, mining remediation, and western history. There are more activities than you can possibly attend, so choose what interests you.

Your week of learning concludes with the enjoyment of watching draft horses and mules in action during the Annual Big Sky Draft Horse Expo at the fair grounds, located just across the road from Grant-Kohrs. The Big Sky Draft Horse Expo has many additional activities that include; Obstacle Course, Pleasure Cart, Feed Team Race, Ladies Cart, Antique/Unique Vehicles, and much more.

Do not forget to enjoy the 5 Museums located at The Old Montana Prison Complex, which are free during the week, to those who purchase a 2010 Expo Event Button.

A study of the preparation, painting and pin striping of horse drawn wagons, buggies, carts and wheels. Topics will include removal of old paint, sanding and sealing, priming, painting/oiling/varnishing, decorative pin striping and proper disposal of waste products. Participants will complete paint board samples and wagon parts using a variety of preparations and finishes. Finish application techniques to include brushing, spraying and off the shelf aerosol cans. Dave Watkins who is an expert in restoration of horse drawn vehicles will be joined by sign artist and skilled paint striper Bob Larson of Missoula. Course materials including specialty brushes will be available for purchase.

The Warm Springs ponds were originally constructed by the Anaconda Company, now owned by Atlantic Richfield Company (ARCO). These ponds were built to hold and treat sediments that flowed downstream in Silver Bow Creek from mining activities in the Butte Mining District. The ponds were first built in 1911 and upgraded in 1916 and 1959. This PowerPoint presentation will provide the history of the ponds, how they mediate pollution on the Clark Fork River, and the transition of the area into a premier wildlife, fishing and recreational complex called the Warm Springs Wildlife Management Area, jointly operated by Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks and ARCO. This presentation will show how pollution facilities can also be an asset to the citizen of an area through recreation activities.

## ACADEMY FACULTY

### JOHN BERRYMAN

John and his family own and operate Prospectors Playground in Deer Lodge. John has been prospecting for 16 years and specializes in teaching the art of panning for gold and screening for sapphires and garnets. With the classes that John offers, you will learn about the basic equipment required for panning, where to look and how to use the equipment. The field class offers a hands on experience for looking for gold in a mountain stream.

### DON CAPP

Don Cappa began his love of history after inheriting his father's gun collection. Over the years, Don has become a Western historian and a collector of Western memorabilia, which he has on display at the Frontier Montana Museum in Deer Lodge. Through his growing collection, Don has developed a love for history and has a strong desire to share the information with others.

### JACK HINKLE

Jack grew up on a ranch near Eureka, MT, cooking on a wood cook stove using cast iron cookware (skillets, griddles, etc.) He was taught from an early age the use and care of them. Jack can't remember a time in life when he didn't have at least a couple of cast iron skillets around. When Jack married his wife, Carol, in 1972, she brought with her another skillet or two, and their collection has expanded since then. In the 90's Jack joined a nationwide cast iron collectors' club whose sole purpose is to educate people on the use, care, and collectability of cast iron cookware. Jack currently has over 600 pieces in his collection, and uses cast iron to cook in every day.

### ED & SUE JAMES

Ed and Sue James started Sugar Loaf Wool Carding Mill April 21, 2000 near Hall, Montana. Ed and Sue wanted to provide an outlet for wool grown by local producers. They take the raw wool and process it in their facility, turning it into wool batts and rovings, pillows, mattress covers, and comforters. All of the finished products are hand sewn. Visitors are welcome to view the wool carding process. School children, quilt guilds, retired teachers, spinning and weaving guilds, and many tourists have enjoyed learning how wool is processed and why wool is a wonderful fiber.

### RUTH LITTLE

Born and raised in the Big Hole Valley – a fifth generation resident. Ruth taught in the Darby school system, and with her husband managed a ranch at Dell, MT. She served on the board of the Beaverhead County Museum and organized the Smithsonian's "Barn-Again" tour. For this presentation she photographed over 200 barns and collected their stories. She discovered barns have a story that needs to be told!

### RON & SHONI MAULING

Ron and Shoni Maulding are an award-winning team who have taken hitching to new levels. They collaborate on all their projects, though not always working on each project together. Shoni hitches horsehair. Ron produces the leatherwork and metal work, usually sterling silver, for the hitched inlays in bolos, buckles, necklaces, etc. Shoni is a native of the Deer Lodge Valley, and Ron once worked as the supervisor for Montana State Prison hobby program. The Moulding's teach workshops on horsehair hitching and have written and published two books on the art.

### BILL MCINTOSH

Bill McIntosh and his wife Jill have spent their lives ranching in the Avon area, thirty miles north of Deer Lodge. The ranch they live and work on has been owned by the family since 1910, and for most of those years the summer job of "putting up hay" has been done with the use of the beaverslide.

### LEE SILLIMAN

Lee Silliman is a local high school Science and Math teacher and has lived in Deer Lodge for the past 36 years. Since his high school days, Lee has been fascinated with the art of the American West. He moved to Montana in 1969 in order to immerse himself in the "Big Sky Country: that Charlie Russell painted so well. In addition to collecting books about the many artists who visually portrayed western frontier culture of the nineteenth century, he recently began framing quality reproductions of their artworks. This collection will be the focus of his talk about the ten most influential artist in this genre.

## **GARY SWANT**

Gary Swant has a Master Degree in Education, with an emphasis in field Ecology from the University of Montana. He taught biology at Powell County High School in Deer Lodge for 25 years and retired in 1993. During his teaching career he taught many college summer courses for both the University of Montana and Montana State University on science related issues. He has also authored a book, and several science curriculums. He has coauthored a number of curriculums in the field of outdoor education and ecology. He has published articles in Montana Outdoors and the National Biology Teacher Magazine.

He has also served as a consultant for the schools, Montana Fish Wild Life and Parks, and Grant-Kohrs National Historic Site authoring 3 field guides and several Environmental Assessments.

Gary is president of GoBirdMontana, a birding guide business. He frequently speaks on birds and leads numerous bird walks for organizations. Swant holds the title of seeing the most species of birds in Montana in one year, 328. He accomplished that goal in 2007.

## **LAURA LEE SWANT**

Laura Lee has been a homemaker and seamstress, and enjoys the culinary skills. She has been doing Crocheted Rag Rugs for years and enjoys teaching others to make their own. She get great satisfaction out of reusing materials to make new products for the home.

## **DAVID WATKINS**

A farm in western North Dakota is where David Watkins started. He grew up in the transition period where horses were still working, but tractors were becoming accepted. His farm style education led him to working in auto mechanics, degrees in vocational education and teaching vocational education. Dave lived in Deer Lodge for many years while he was the director of the Montana State Prison vocational education program.

Dave's enjoyment of woodworking and metal fabrication led him into the repair and restoration of horse drawn vehicles. His hobby has grown into Wagon & Wheel Works, a full time retirement business. Not content with just accurate historical restorations, Dave has continued to teach. His wagon wheel building courses are highly recommended.

Dave now conserves and restores horse drawn vehicles and teaches classes in wheelwrighting, body and upholstery restoration at Wagon & Wheel Works in Manning, North Dakota.

## **OTHER ACTIVITIES**

**Attend the 15<sup>th</sup> Annual Big Sky Draft Horse Expo** at the fairgrounds across from Grant-Kohrs, Saturday and Sunday September 18 and 19. Singles to 6 horse hitches will again be showing at the Fairgrounds in Deer Lodge during two performances each day. Working teamster events including the popular feed team races are included. Some new events are included this year, as well as two additional performances.

The 2010 class of inductees to **the Montana Draft Teamster Hall of Fame** will be presented at the start of the Saturday afternoon performance on September 19th. This honor belongs to those Montana teamsters who have demonstrated a commitment to the preservation, education, and community service using draft animals. The Hall is sponsored by both the Montana Draft Horse and Mule Association and Big Sky Draft Horse Expo.

## **EXPO EVENT BUTTON**

Purchase of the \$15 Event Button Entry provides entry to both days of the Annual Big Sky Draft Horse Expo. This button also provides 4 days of free admission to the five Old Prisons Museums and discounts at some merchants in downtown Deer Lodge, and entry to prize drawings during the show. The event button is truly a bargain. (The daily admission alone to Expo is \$8 and it is \$8 per day for the Prison Museums admission.)

## **Montana Auto Museum**

Too many to list, but too much to miss, is a visit to the Montana Auto Museum in the Old Prison. Over 140 cars are on display from classic Chevy, Mopar and Ford muscle cars to a Schacht high wheeler and a 1903 Ford with tonneau and wicker side baskets. Listed by *USA Today* as one of the Top 10 "Must See" Car Museums in the country, the Montana Auto Museum offers a splendid display of automotive history.

## **Old Prison Museum**

Listed on the National Register of Historic Places, The Old Prison Museum was the working prison for Montana from 1871 to 1979. Old Montana Prison was built by inmate labor under the supervision of Warden Frank Conley. The complex survived riots and fire during its 108 years of operation until it was relocated 5 miles west of town.

## **Yesterday's Playthings**

Generations of toys played with by children of all ages, are on display. Trains, cars, doll, teddy bears, and antique dolls and doll furniture are just a few of the categories housed in this museum. Everyone can take a trip down memory lane while viewing all the playthings inside this museum.

## **Frontier Montana Museum**

Housed in the Old Prisons Mule Barn and fittingly so, artifacts in this museum showcase the old west. Items include saloon memorabilia, cowboy and Indian artifacts, and Libby Custer's silver tea service. Situated next door is Cottonwood City, a representation of what a frontier town would have been like. This is the perfect place to get lost in your mind about how life was when the west was still wild.

## **Powell County Museum**

Powell County Museum features artifacts pertaining to the history of the Deer Lodge Valley. Current displays feature wood carved folk art, mining, period furnishings, and other collectables. Here visitors will find a little bit of everything to entertain their eyes.
